## 1. BDD Basics & Fundamentals

## 2. BDD Timeline & Requirements

You must file your BDD claim between 180-90 days before your separation date. This means you cannot file more than 180 days out, and you cannot file with less than 90 days remaining on active duty. Missing this window means you cannot use BDD.

### What if I have less than 90 days until separation?

If you have less than 90 days until separation, you cannot use the BDD program. However, you can file a Quick Start claim or a regular claim after separation. These won't be as fast as BDD, but they're still valid options for obtaining VA benefits.

### What are the basic eligibility requirements for BDD?

To qualify for BDD, you must: (1) Have a determined separation date, (2) Be within 180-90 days of separation, (3) Have current medical diagnoses for your claimed conditions, (4) Have service/medical records to support your claims, and (5) Submit a completed Separation Health Assessment (SHA) Part A.

### Can National Guard or Reserve members use BDD?

Yes, if you're National Guard or Reserve being released from active duty after at least 180 days of continuous service, you can file a BDD claim. The same timeline and requirements apply as for regular active duty personnel.

### What if I can't get all my military medical records?

### How many buddy statements should I include?

There's no specific number required, but quality matters more than quantity. Include buddy statements from people who witnessed your injuries, observed your symptoms, or can speak to how your conditions affect your daily activities. Even 1-2 strong, detailed buddy statements can be very valuable.

### Should I submit original documents or copies?

Always submit copies, never original documents. Keep all original documents for your personal records. Make clear, legible copies of all medical records, buddy statements, and supporting documentation. The VA processes copies just as effectively as originals.

## 5. BDD Exams & Medical Evaluations

### What happens during BDD medical exams?

BDD medical exams (C&P exams) are conducted by VA-contracted doctors to evaluate your claimed conditions. The examiner will review your medical history, perform physical tests, ask about symptoms and limitations, and assess how your conditions affect your ability to work and perform daily activities.

### How should I prepare for my BDD medical exam?

Preparation is crucial. ### What if I can't make it to a scheduled VA exam?

Contact the VA immediately to reschedule. Missing a VA exam without proper notice can result in your claim being denied or delayed significantly. The VA is usually accommodating for rescheduling if you provide advance notice and a valid reason.

### How long do VA exams typically take?

Most VA exams take 30-90 minutes, depending on the complexity and number of conditions being evaluated. Mental health evaluations may take longer. Complex cases with multiple conditions might require multiple separate exams with different specialists.

### Can I bring someone with me to my VA exam?

Generally, you can bring a support person to your exam, especially for mental health evaluations. However, check with the examining facility beforehand as policies may vary. The support person typically cannot participate in the examination but can provide moral support.
